
Breathing Free? Changing the Constitution



The Declaration of Independence, Adopted on July 4th 1776

« We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all Men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness »

Unalienable /ʌnˈeɪljənəbəl/: cannot be taken away Endowed /ɪnˈdaʊd/: to be given something

Section 3: ... it shall not be lawful for any freedman, free negro or mulatto to intermarry with any white person; not for any person to intermarry with any freedman, free negro or mulatto; and any person who shall so intermarry shall be deemed guilty of felony, and on conviction thereof shall be confined in the State penitentiary for life...

Black Codes Mississippi, 1865

Freedman / fri:d_mæn/: a former slave
Mulatto /mju:'lætəʊ/: non-offensive: person of mixed race
Deem: consider
Felony / feləni/: a serious crime
